
Writing Skills

We are going to be practising using apostrophes. There are 2 ways to use apostrophes.



Contractions

Joining two words together.

The apostophe shows where some letters have been taken out. Sometimes letters are taken out and move around a little bit.

e.g. will not = won't

Possessive

To show who things belong to. You usually add an apostrophe and an s to show this.

e.g. Sienna's coat.
The man's pizza.

If a name or word ends in an s already, then you can just add the apostrophe.

e.g. James' dog.
